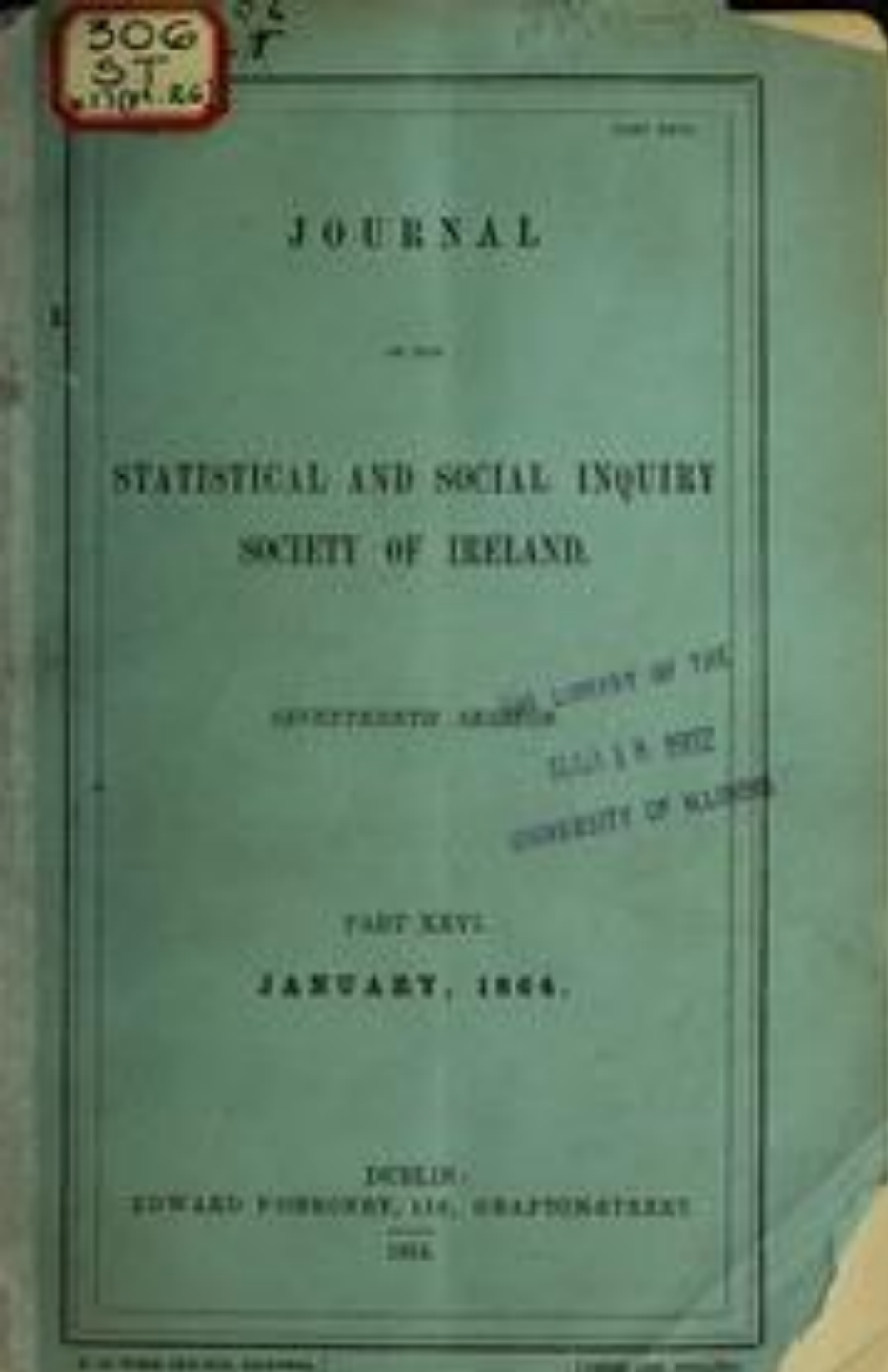

ever, is 90 feet longer than the "Mauretania" of the Cunard Company, has $4\frac{1}{2}$ feet wider beam, and could take 6,000 tons more cargo in addition to many more passengers. With only 30,000 indicated horse-power for her reciprocating engines, and 16,000 shaft horse-power for her turbine, the "Olympic" will make a speed of 21 knots. The "Mauretania" can make 26 knots, but requires 75,000 shaft horse-power in order to do it.

For the building of these enormous steamers "Olympic" and "Titanic," very large additions to the equipment of the Queen's Island shipyard were made, as well as to the engine shops and the other works, which to-day are all fitted with the best and most powerful tools, and the most approved mechanical appliances for manipulating the heavy weights involved. There is a 200-ton floating crane, specially designed for Harland and Wolff's work, which is, I believe, the largest appliance of its kind in the world. At the south end of the yard, there is a new system of electric cantilever cranes over the building slips. At the north end of the yard, formerly equipped with powerful hydraulic travelling cranes or gantries for three slips, there now stands an immense double gantry for two large slips, which deserves detailed description, as there is nothing that can compare with it elsewhere. Including the great amount of piling and reinforced concrete to obtain a firm ground-bed, this great structure has cost above quarter of a million; it was designed to the requirements of Messrs. Harland and Wolff, and erected, by the engineering staff of Sir William Arrol & Co., Limited. The structure has a total length of 840 feet, and consists of three rows of towers placed 80 feet apart longitudinally, the two avenues, or "berths" between these three rows being 121 feet wide transversely. The towers support longitudinal girders tied together transversely at their tops. Over the central row of towers runs a high rail-track (176 feet above ground-level) on which a large cantilever crane may travel the whole length of the structure. This cantilever crane can lift 3 tons at a radius of 135 feet, or 5 tons at a radius of 65 feet; it has lifting, racking, slewing, and travelling motions; so that it commands a length of over 1,050 feet, a width of 270 feet, and can lift or deposit material anywhere over this large area. Then, spanning each "berth," there are three over-head travelling frames running on rails (148 feet above ground-level) placed on the longitudinal girders over the rows of towers, and each of these travelling frames contains two 10-ton travelling cranes. Another rail-track (118 feet above ground-level) is provided at the bottom of the same longitudinal girders, which carries 3-ton walking cranes. The six travelling frames, each provided with two 10-ton cranes, are for supporting riveting machines, and each of the 10-ton cranes may stretch

Ireland's **National Open Research Forum** (NORF) was established in 2017 to drive the national agenda for Open Research. NORF provides a space for communication, consultation and cooperation among key stakeholders in the research system regarding strategic issues and overarching policies and procedures on Open Research. NORF developed Ireland's National Framework on the Transition to an Open Research Environment (2019) and National Action Plan for Open Research (2022). Since 2022, NORF has administered an Open Research Fund to support the implementation of the National Action Plan.

Ireland's National Action Plan for Open Research

Ireland's *National Action Plan for Open Research* outlines objectives and actions for the next chapter in Ireland's transition towards open research. It serves as a roadmap for the implementation of open research across Ireland, outlining national goals and coordinated actions that will assist the Irish research system as a whole to better support open research practices.

The National Action Plan is structured according to three themes: Establishing a culture of open research; achieving 100% open access to research publications; and enabling FAIR research data and other outputs.

Institutional Open Access Policies and Rights Retention

Project Title: SCOIR: Secondary rights, Copyright, Open access, Institutional policies, and Rights retention

Host Institution: Trinity College Dublin

Project Leads: Prof. Eoin O'Dell (TCD) and Ms Frances Madden (TU Dublin)

This project will assess and present options to make it easier for researchers to retain their rights for the works they publish and make their work open access. The project will adopt a two-pronged approach to policy and legislative change by exploring the potential of developing a secondary publishing right in Irish legislation and by adopting institutional rights retention policies. SCOIR will also develop an open access policy framework for both funders and institutions that is aligned with the National Action Plan and international best practice.

A further nine projects received funding under Strand II, **Open Research Stimulus 2023**, which seeks to stimulate and advance the uptake of open research by recognising and rewarding researchers from all disciplines who want to play a leading role in advancing open research in Ireland. All projects funded under Strand II align with and address one of the three themes of the National Action Plan for Open Research:

1. Establishing a culture of open research
2. Achieving 100% open access to research publications
3. Enabling FAIR research data and other outputs

Lessons Learned

- **Student publishing bridges the research and the teaching and learning 'divide'**
 - requiring participants to address practical issues in research integrity, research management and scholarly communication – huge potential for development as part of inclusive learning / open pedagogical modes.
- **Community of Practice approach works** – both amongst the student journal managers & between new and long-established journals – stimulating questioning & innovation.
- **Need for training in all aspects of the publishing process**
 - far greater than expected – and associated with open science.
- **Transition to parallel or tandem process (print and electronic)**
 - preferred by pre-existing journals in order to fully understand the process & allow time to make necessary decisions (policy-related and other).
- **Clear annual 'handover' model required per student journal** – to seamlessly support annual changes of journal personnel (student journal managers & editorial boards).
- **Student publishers' commitment to ethical and global issues is overwhelming** – challenging all of us to find conceptual and technical solutions beyond the mainstream.

Expect the unexpected! E.g., Global pandemics!

More Lessons Learned

- Need for training in writing SLA's and Partnership Agreements
- Need for understanding of sustainability of journals, exit strategies, export/import to other platforms (the content will outlive the platform)
- Library Publishing Curriculum is excellent for all (not just Librarians)
- Also COPE training, OASPA, etc.
- Very poor understanding of copyright and rights retention – much more training needed at all research career stages
